Converting Jews Back to Judaism for 30 Years By **Alex Rose**

ulius Ciss has always considered himself Jewish, even during the five years in the late 1970s when he believed in Jesus. Ciss, the founder and executive director of Jews for Judaism, said that Messianic Jewish missionaries tailored their brand of Christianity to be similar to traditional Judaism, so that it would be familiar and comforting to their potential converts – Jewish people who do not feel fulfilled in their spiritual lives.

do not feel fulfilled in their spiritual lives. When Ciss went to Messianic Jewish services, he would see people wearing kippot and tallitot, and sometimes there would be an Aron Kodesh with a Torah scroll inside. All the Christian names and terms were Hebraicized: Jesus became Yehoshua, Mary became Miriam, the New Testament became Brit Hadasha (meaning "New Covenant") and so on.

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"This can make a Jewish person feel comfortable and not have the guilt that one would assume a Jew would have in being open to the message of Christianity," said Ciss, who had earlier rejected more overt Christian messaging. "So my strong identity as a Jew, even though I didn't understand much about it, was the only reason that I went to this Hebrew Christian group.

A group of Jewish activists eventually got through to Ciss and, in 1980, he left the Messianic Jewish movement. He spent of the better part of the '80s doing countermissionary work on his own. Then, in 1989, he started Jews for Judaism in Toronto, after an American organization with the same name reached out to him.

Over the past three decades, Jews for Judaism, which will be celebrating its 30th anniversary in November, has worked with countless Messianic Jews, teaching them about the true Jewish faith. The organization also works with Jewish people who practice Eastern religions, struggle with intermarriage or feel apathetic about

their Judaism. It devotes a large portion of its resources to educational programs designed to show Jews that Messianic Judaism is really just Christianity in disguise.

"Through our educational program, what we hope to do is inoculate the Jewish community against the threat of missionaries and possibly cults ... so that Jewish people will be a little bit more cautious when they see the red flags of these groups and also have a stronger understanding of Judaism," said Ciss.

He said there are an estimated 350,000 to 500,000 Jews around the world who have fallen for Messianic Judaism, and ideally Jews for Judaism would like to reach all of them. But in practice, once a Jewish person begins to feel comfortable in a Messianic Jewish community, it can be very difficult to reach them. That's why he believes that preventive measures are necessary.

That's also why the first step to reintegrating these Jews isn't teaching them about real Judaism, said Rabbi Michael Skobac, the

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organization's director of education. The first step is establishing trust.

"When it comes to Jews who are involved with Christianity, they are basically told not to speak with us. They are told that we are Satan, we're the devil, we're the Antichrist," said Rabbi Skobac. "Even if they're not told that, they're thrilled with what they're doing. They're happy. They didn't see anything in Judaism that was compelling. Now they have a rich, vibrant spiritual life ... why should they sabotage what's making them so happy?"

Instead of lecturing closed-off Messianic Jews about Judaism, Rabbi Skobac said the goal is to make them curious about Judaism.

"A lot of the work is basically breaking that hard ground and trying to open someone up to be willing to even engage with us. So once that happens, it's pretty easy. Because we believe that the case for Judaism is incredibly strong, and that the foundations of the Christian faith are not that strong," said Rabbi Skobac.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED



uring the summer months, Christian missionary groups like Jews for Jesus take to the streets and target pedestrians with their proselytizing literature. They also distract drivers at rush hour by waving at them and holding large street-corner banners promoting Jews for Jesus. In response, Jews for Judaism needs volunteers for its counter-missionary campaign to oppose this threat.

We need volunteers for our Counter-Missionary Rapid Response Unit to be available on short notice, on a stand-by basis, to help in this effort. Volunteers will act as "Counter-Leafletters" distributing our counter-missionary literature in a non-confrontational manner on the street beside the missionaries or stand next to the missionaries on street corners at rush hour with our own banners. Jews for Judaism is also seeking dedicated individuals to act as "Spotters" who will notify us if, when and where missionaries appear.

When the Jews for Jesus "Summer Street Campaign" begins, it usually lasts for 2-3 weeks in July and August, with most activity at morning rush hour (7:30-9:00 a.m.), lunch hour (11:30-1:30 p.m.) and evening rush hour (4:00-6:00 p.m.). 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SHAVUOT the Festival of Love

ove doesn't calculate. Love does not hear the discouraging voices. Love is innocent. Love yearns and it follows. But love does not ask: what will I gain? Could I really get there?

Scripture doesn't throw around the term: "love" very lightly. In all of Scripture, Abraham is the only one that God describes as: "the one who loved me". (It is said of Solomon: "and he loved the Lord" – 1 Kings 3:3, and David

declares: "I love you Lord of my strength" – Psalm 18:2. Indeed, David's love for God still inspires Israel today and Solomon wrote the ultimate love-song; Song of Songs, but Abraham still stands out with his love for God highlighted as a part of his very identity, and this from God, in the first person.)

Abraham did not know where his love would lead him to. Abraham did not know where it could possibly lead him to. How could a created being form a bond with the Creator of all? But love does not calculate – love just follows. Abraham saw that God is kindness, he followed kindness. Abraham saw that God is truth, he followed truth. He didn't stop to ask himself: how could I ever reach God's kindness or God's truth? Abraham did not hear the discouraging voice that contended: "you will never be righteous in His eyes" – "you are inescapably tainted with the sin of Adam". Abraham yearned and he followed.

Ruth didn't calculate either. She didn't ask herself: what hope is there for a Moabite widow in God's nation? She just followed.

Israel didn't calculate. They did not ask themselves: where will this relationship end up? How could we, created beings, form any meaningful relationship with the Creator of all? They just followed (Jeremiah 2:2).

Shavuot, the Festival of weeks, is not about love. Passover is about love. Passover is when Israel followed God into the unknown, into the impossible. Passover is followed by seven weeks.



Seven weeks of yearning. Seven weeks of following.

The Festival of weeks is God's reciprocation to sincere love. On this day God reached out to Israel with an eternal embrace. He presented His beloved nation with the innermost expression of His will; His holy Torah. God formed an eternal bond with this nation that loved Him; a bond that would have been impossible to imagine. A bond between Creator and created. But love does not follow rules.

Ruth's love brought David and Solomon to the world. Ruth's love for God brought her to the center of God's plan for the universe. She could never have dreamed of such an outcome. But love does not look at the outcome. Love simply follows.

God responded to Abraham's love with Isaac, the child of laughter. Laughter - because it does not make sense. A child to a one hundred year old man?! Not just any child. But a child that will father a nation of human beings that will be granted an eternal commission from God – a commission to carry the truth, the holiness and the blessing of the Creator of all throughout the corridors of history. Is it possible for created beings to be entrusted with the work of the Creator of all?! Could Abraham have imagined that this is where his love would lead him to? Of-course not! But Abraham wasn't looking for a payoff when he began his journey of love. Abraham simply loved, and love does not calculate. 🗖

tried to reach me but I simply refused to listen and I let them talk to the wall. Since, as long as I can remember, I was


always negative about Judaism. But this ALL changed
